As some of you have heard me explain, in worship, one of the cruxes of this synod gathering was to introduce the "Three Great Loves" initiative in the UCC. These loves -for neighbor, children, and creation- are the lenses through which we as a church will try to focus our mission, ministry, and worship for the next two years. When I introduced these in worship, I mentioned that these lenses did not mean that we had to stop what we were doing, plan new things, and re-invent the wheel. Instead, these focuses -and the gospel message they represent- give us the opportunity to ask "Is what we're doing gospel-oriented? If not, what could we do differently or change so that our work might address one of these lenses?" For we at St. John's, I can say that virtually all of our works, at this time, seem to address these lenses. I wonder, however, if these lenses might provide an opportunity for us to follow-up and follow-through on some of potential things we've talked about in the past? Might we find new ways to become an eco-friendly congregation? Might we find new ways to welcome children into our worship -not just with a fine nursery, but with a dedicated and welcoming space in our sanctuary? What could we do? What will we do?

I don't know about you, but the thought of dreaming and living-into new things gets me ex-



cited! Certainly, there's only so much that a church our size can realistically do, but we also know a God who tends to work outside of realistic expectations, don't we? Hopefully these thoughts have you as energized as they have me!

In other news, things are starting to gear-up for our autumn season here at St. John's and it looks to be a wonderfully active time! Between special music, opportunities to learn, special worship services, and many other things,

we have a really neat autumn to look forward to! Make sure to check out some of the details in this and the next Tower Times so you don't miss out on any of the fun!


St. John's Choir




Bible Study (Meeting Every Thursday at 11am from September 5th until Advent.)

The Budget & Finance Committee met Sunday July 9, 2017, present at the meeting were: Dee Goudy, Secretary, Ron Duckson, Vice Chair, Patsy Goin, Debbie Watts, Jeff Gerrior and Rev. Adam Wirrig. Patty Staley, Chair, arrived late.

The meeting was called to order by Reverend Wirrig as ex-officio Chair. The minutes from the June 4, 2017 meeting were reviewed and approved.

Jeff Gerrior presented the Treasurer's Report for the month of June 2017. It was noted that giving was down again for the month of June, but remains ahead of last year by \$5,170. Deficit spending continues to trend be lower than prior years. Expenses included payroll, utilities, office supplies, cleaning supplies, light bulbs, music and special guests totaling \$12,538. Patty raised a question regarding the Flower Account and the Suspense Fund which indicates a deficit for flowers of \$182.60 year-to-date. Jeff will see if the Suspense Fund can be renamed to something more appropriate and if the calculation can be fixed or eliminated altogether. Jeff noted that the Suspense Fund was supposed to zero out at the end of each year but has been accumulating rather than zeroing out so it is not a true reflection of this year only. The checking balance is at \$16,356.26 for the month.

In Old Business:

The Committee continues to work toward presentation of Stewardship in the month of September.

Organ update from Reverend Wirrig noted that Mueller has removed the parts and they are proceeding with work. He noted that a reasonable expected completion would be by Advent but could possibly/hopefully be sooner if all goes well.

Safe Church is progressing under the direction of Chris Van Breukelen utilizing the Insurance Board system.

The Website continues to be revised and it was noted that if you are on the Website and see something that needs attention you should notify Cheré. Again, Cheré is doing a great job on the conversion of the Website, thank you.

Historic Registry, Reverend Wirrig explained that Counsel voted to go with a Level Two option which is much less involved and is at no cost giving us a designation as a local landmark through the City of Dayton. We will be able to apply for city and state grants but they are highly competitive. Should we later decide to go with the more restrictive option with the National Historic Registry which opens us up to federal grant funds, the cost would be \$3,000 through a contact with the City of Dayton to assist in that process.

With respect to the Director of Family Life Ministries Reverend Wirrig noted that he has contacted the institutions through which we are interested in attempting fill the position. He also has become aware of possible funds through the UCC that he is looking into that would possibly fund this position for a longer term and make it more of a full-time position rather than a part time possibly short term role.

Reverend Wirrig noted that there has been no activity with respect to the Constitution & By-Laws but also noted that at Synod there was a presentation on the UCC's move to update the overall Constitution of the Synod and that congregations should also look to make similar changes beneficial to the Churches today. In further follow-up with respect to the Constitution and By-Laws, at Council Meeting on July 11th, the Wednesday following Budget & Finance Meeting, the Council agreed to begin the process of making needed revisions and is reviewing in detail the current Constitution and By-Laws.

In New Business Patty Staley reminded the Committee, yes she did make it near the end of the meeting, that it is time for the Budget process to start and that we should be expecting to receive Committee budgets by the August Council Meeting. She noted that the entire Committee will review and make recommendations prior to submission to Council. The question was raised if Patty would be working with Jeff on the budget and it was noted that yes they will be but the entire Committee will have input prior to submission to Council. This is a Committee process but as a member of the congregation, I welcome your input. So if you have a concern about the budget and finances of the Church and would like to share that with me, I will gladly address the matter

as we are going through the process.

Council Meeting Minutes from the June meeting were shared with the Committee. Items from which were addressed previously in this report.

While Patty Staley did miss a majority of the meeting, Revered Wirrig did advise her of the information covered until her arrival so that she could complete this report.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The next meeting of the Budget & Finance Committee will be August 6, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.

If anyone has any questions or concerns regarding the information discussed in the Budget & Finance Committee, I welcome you to speak with me at any time. I also invite anyone who would like to attend the meetings to join us as a guest. If you have something that needs to be addressed at the meeting, let me know so that I can place the information on the agenda.


East End Community Services:
