So, enjoy your time with Rev. Jeff, try to stay out of trouble, and I'll see you soon enough with new information and new perspectives!




President's Report

The Budget & Finance Committee met Sunday June 4, 2017. Present at the meeting were: Patty Staley, Chair, Dee Goudy, Secretary, Ron Duckson, Vice Chair, Jeff Gerrior and Rev. Adam Wirrig. Patsy Goin and Debbie Watts were unable to attend.

The meeting was called to order and the minutes from the May 7, 2017 meeting were reviewed and approved.

Jeff Gerrior presented the Treasurer's Report for the month of May 2017. It was noted that giving was down for the month of May which is typical for this time of year and possibly due to vacations, school being out, etc. It was also noted that we remain ahead on year to date giving by \$7,115. Deficit spending is still trending to be lower than prior years. There were donations this month to the Percy Jones Scholars for Sacred Choral Music account including a receipt from SONKA of \$585.25 thanks to Reverend Wirrig's grant submission. The payment was received from MVCTC for the ESOL Facility Donation account. RAMM Expense for the month was \$255 for miscellaneous maintenance items. The checking balance is at \$17,999.50 for the month.

In Old Business, the Committee continues to work toward presentation of Stewardship in the month of September. Organ tuning was not able to be done due to the weather but the assessment was done and Reverend expects to receive the completed report in the next week. The Safe Church program is in process of being completed through the Insurance Board. The new Website is continuing to be revised and updated – thank you Cheré for your work on this. The Historic Registry and Director of Family Life Ministries were addressed in the recent Tower Times. Ron Duckson raised a question for clarification on the Historic Regis-

try regarding the anticipation of grants and other funds that would benefit the Church through remodel, etc. that would offset the cost of the application process – Patty advised that it is the goal of the project to seek grants and funds that would offset the cost of the application process (such as through the receipt of tax credits that could possibly be transferred to an area developer at a cost) and funds for the actual work to repaint and repair the exterior of the building. More details will be provided in the Information Meeting on June 25th. The Constitution and By-Laws were briefly discussed and will be addressed further at Council.

In New Business the potential for Patio Area Transition for the lower level patio by the K-12 Gallery has been tabled due to cost. Other alternatives will still be considered. Patty advised the Committee that she and Reverend Wirrig had recently attended the 2017 Downtown Dayton Summit: The Resurgence of Downtown Dayton where panelists Mayor Nan Whaley,

Charles Simms (Developer), Dr. Michael Irvin (Co-Chair of the Downtown Dayton Partnership), Jason Woodward (Developer) answered questions and addressed issues regarding the development that is on-going in Dayton. The goal of attending this Summit was to be aware of the developments as they will affect the area around the Church and to get to know the who's who doing the development that might be contacts for work on restoration in connection with the Historic Registry and other connections we might benefit from.

Council Meeting Minutes from the May meeting were shared with the Committee items from which were addressed previously in this report.

The next meeting of the Budget & Finance Committee will be July 9, 2017 at 9:00 a.m.

If anyone has any questions or concerns regarding the information discussed in the Budget & Finance Committee, I welcome you to speak with me at any time. I also invite anyone who would like to attend the meetings to join us as a guest. If you have something that needs to be addressed at the meeting, let me know so that I can place the information on the agenda.

Pulling for the Ronald McDonald House

During the announcements in the Sunday service on June 18, the congregation was stunned to see several large cardboard boxes and two large Ronald McDonald houses near the pulpit. They were soon further astonished and greatly pleased to learn from the Reverend Dr. Wirring that all containers were brimming with can tabs for the Ronald McDonald House. Delight increased upon learning that these had been collected and contributed by the students and staff of Brookville Elementary School under the leadership of teacher Jackie Munn, friend of Patty Staley. Janet Neubauer, the president of the Women of St. John's, the group who oversees this project, came forward to receive the gift and express the WSJ's gratitude to Brookville Elementary students, teachers, and staff in supporting this cause.

After the service, I arrived and with the much needed and appreciated assistance of the Reverend Dr. Wirring, the heavy boxes were loaded in my car for the trip to the Ronald McDonald House. However, I first took them home to weigh the tabs and re-bag them, discarding any that were not aluminum (There are so many different styles, believe it or not, and in those styles, it

can be difficult to discern the aluminum tabs from the tin ones, which have no monetary value.) With the handy aid of my husband's workshop tool consisting of a very strong magnet on an adjustable wooden rod, I was able to stir through the tabs and "fish out" the tin ones.

But I found other items of interest, too. Countless little baggies and zip locks some with lots of tabs, some with only a few, and several big bags wellstuffed; bags with a variety of markings—some with teacher's names, some with room numbers, some with initials, some with first names, some with several names, most in children's writing, some in adult's, and my favorite, a sticky pad note (I have changed the names, but not the content): Henry, These are from Brian via Grandpa Larkin. Marian. I really appreciated seeing how so many people of all ages and with quite a variant in their number of tabs to offer had all worked together for a cause affecting so many other families. Nevertheless, there were other indications of how hurried lives can get. Mixed in the bags of tabs, I found 27 Labels for Education worth 65 points and 5 Box Tops for Education; 7 pennies and 3 dimes; 4 paperclips, 1 S-hook, 1 hearing aid size battery, 1 AAA battery, 3 different screws, 4 long twisty-ties, a 3" tall gold metal letter C made to stand up, and an empty Equal packet. These mistaken enclosures made me think of the times I've said to myself "Where could I have put that ? I just had it!"

However, back to the matter at hand. On the Tuesday after we received the tabs, I took 54 lbs. of tabs to the Ronald McDonald House and recycled 1½ lbs. of tin tabs. I recycled the many small plastic bags at Meijer's. I'm mailing back to Jackie the labels and the coins for the school. The other items are in the trash. Except the paperclips—I admit I'm using them.
